NOVICE/NEW GROWERS REPORT

The monthly meeting for the Novice/New growers Group was held on Sunday, 24th February and once again there was a good attendance of members at the Townsville Orchid Society Inc. hall, Charles Street, Kirwan to listen to our Guest Speaker, Ted Boon who spoke in detail of what the judges look for when judging orchid plants at various orchid shows. Ted also commented on the guide lines permitted for staking and tying up of orchid flowers and other jobs you need to do when you bring your plants along to orchid shows. Thanks Ted for your time and expert knowledge you gave to the members on this subject. Another item that was mentioned was those nasty insect pests, such as Thrip, Orchid Beetle and White Fly, so be vigilant and inspect your plants regularly and take whatever precaution is necessary. A clean and tidy shade house is most essential for all orchid growers.

We would like to thank Jeff, Alison and Steve who brought along the compots of Dendrobium and Phalaenopsis seedlings to whom a seedling of each type was given to each member present to take home to pot up and to return their plants each month to be measured for our growing competition this year. A small potting demonstration and the potting media that they use was given by Alison and Warren. It was somewhat disappointing to find out that of all the Dendrobium seedlings (3 compots) which were donated by Shane Snow of J&V's Fraser Coast Dendrobium, and distributed out to our members a couple of years ago, only six plants have survived. A well known and expert grower of phalaenthe and bigibbum dendrobium orchids, Ray Nicholls, has offered to be the Guest Speaker at our next meeting to speak on how he grows his plants so maybe then we will have more success in growing these genera in the future.

HERE WE GROW AGAIN

Yes, our 2013 growing competition has begun. In fact we have two new growing competition plants.

Firstly there is *Den*. Virtual Magic x *Den*. Suan 'Big White' purchased from the Cairns Orchid Centre. The parents of *Den*. Virtual Magic are *Den*. Autumn Show x *Den*. Polar Queen and it was registered in 2003 by A. Watkinson with the annotation that the originator of this cross was Kev McFarlane. Unfortunately I cannot find any reference to *Den*. Suan. When your plant is measured, its height will be used.

The *Phalaenopsis* seedling, which came from Steve Fay, is *Phal*. Da-chien Spider Beauty x sib. (*Phal*. Da-chien Spider Beauty = *Phal*.

Chih Shang's Stripes x *Phal*. Ho's French Fantasia, registered by Ming-Rong Tsay in2000). Interestingly also, there are at least 12 hybrids registered with *Phal*. Da-chien Spider Beauty as a parent. The clones of *Phal*. Da-chien Spider Beauty that Steve used in this sibling crossing can best be described as having exhibition type flowers with a white background overlaid with distinctive, patterned crimson striping. In measuring your plant the total leaf span will be used.

The distribution of these two growing competition plants to TOS members and visitors who intend becoming TOS members who did not receive theirs last month, will continue at the March meetings (no cost involved). For those of you who have received them, I hope you have potted them into your favourite medium and they have settled in well. Bring them to the meetings for measurement and you could be the lucky grower to win a prize. Happy Growing.

Bark! Bark!

Many old and wise growers will tell you that it really does not matter what medium you grow your orchids in as long as you then match it to your conditions, such as your watering routine. They will then proceed to try every new mixture that is talked about over a cup of tea and scone at many an orchid society meeting as they try to produce those grand champions and FCCs, all the time insisting that in reality their mix is great, but I might just give this new one a try.

A little while ago I gave out free samples of New Zealand bark to some "experienced" growers of the Townsville Orchid Society to try and then comment on, as a medium for orchids in Townsville. Here are a few assessments.

- 1. Found to be successful with *Bulbophyllums*.
- 2. Used in a mix with quincan gravel and pink rock for *Cattleyas* and there was no difference in the growth of the plants when compared to other barks or coconut husks. I have not tried it on *Dendrobiums* or *Vandas* yet.
- 3. Substituted for SA bark in a bark, rock and perlite mix for *Cattleyas* out of community pots and found that the growths were comparable. This NZ bark was much drier out of the bag.

This bark is available from Orchidaceous Supplies at Tinana (Maryborough). Their website states, "Kiwi Orchid Bark is a high quality *Pinus radiata* bark, obtained from the renewable pine plantations of New Zealand. It is very clean, hard and long lasting, of uniform size and is dust and contaminant free." It is available in four sizes (3mmto 8mm, 8mm to 20mm, 20mm to 25mm and 25mm to 50mm) at \$32.00 per 50L bag, or \$27.00 per bag in a pallet quantity of 40 bags. Freight costs have to be added.

So if you want to try it, and especially if you are travelling through Maryborough, then contact Grahame. He will be only too happy to help you. Happy Growing.

Latest Growth Fertiliser.

Selecting a suitable growing fertiliser for our orchids can at times prove frustrating if we worry about the uselessness of urea as a nitrogen source. Well one growing fertiliser that derives its nitrogen from sources other than urea is *Peters Professional Winter Grow Special* and the good news is that it is now available to TOS members at the club shop.

This water soluble fertiliser also contains the trace elements iron, manganese, boron, copper, zinc and molybdenum, although along with most other fertilisers it lacks calcium and magnesium so good growers will need to also fertilise with a magnesium source, the simplest being epsom salts (magnesium sulphate, available at your supermarket when you do your grocery shopping), and a calcium source, such as calcium nitrate, which is available at the TOS members' shop. [Note that soluble calcium nitrate needs to be applied separately and not mixed with other fertilisers.] For more information on Peters Professional Winter Grow Special fertilizer view the whole bag or MSDS at the next meeting.

For members who are applying fertiliser at the 100ppm Nitrogen rate, you need to mix *Peters* Professional Winter Grow Special fertiliser at a rate of only 0.5g/L. Happy growing!

Guarianthe bowringiana var coerulea

Guarianthe bowringiana (O'Brien) Dressler & W.E. Higgins 2003 (Previously Cattleya bowringiana) This strong and easily grown orchid is recommended for any beginner grower, as it is tolerant of variations in heat, sun and humidity. In fact, it must have bright conditions for the best growth. It has stems about 60cm tall with two or more thick leaves, and a distinctive swollen bulb at the base of the pseudobulb, which makes it identifiable "at a glance". If grown well, it can have up to 40 flowers per spike, which all open at the same time. As encouragement for the new grower, even small plants will bloom with one or two flowers. It needs a short rest after flowering (less water, no fertiliser).

In nature, the plant is found in Guatemala and Belize on rocky cliffs above rapid streams, which charge the air with moisture. It was introduced by Veitch and Sons in 1884 and named in 1885 after J. C. Bowring, a keen amateur grower who lived near Windsor, England. For more than 100 years it was known as Cattleya bowringiana, but in 2003 the genus Guarianthe was created to separate those Cattleya species growing in Central America from those in South America (principally in Brazil). Other Cattleya species affected by the name change include C. skinneri, C. aurantiaca, C. deckeri and C. patinii.

Guarianthe bowringiana is such an easygoing easy-growing orchid that I have been guilty in the past of neglecting its care, comfortable with the thought that it would cheerfully flower without my attention. I was jolted out of that frame of mind when it recently outgrew its pot and I found I had not re-potted it for 7 years! It is flowering now, earlier than its usual time when it shows its beauty at the TOS Autumn show.
