# On our Cover - 3 NEW RUFFLED MARHIGOS®

SUMMER GLORY

FALLING STAR

For many years we have devoted much effort to developing these extremely ruffled beauties with unusual "pompon" centers made up of many extra petaloids. These 3 seedlings are some of the finest specimens of this type we have produced to date. If you are looking for something different and beautiful in *Iris kaempferi*, we believe anyone of these will afford you much pleasure. All three come into flower late in the season.

ACCLAIM Each \$7.50

The first heavily ruffled, with multiple tufted center, Marhigo in the red shade color group to be offered by us. The color might be described as deep rosy lavender somewhat similar to ROSE PRELUDE. The cluster of snowy white central petaloids with rose-purple tips sets the flower off to best advantage. Prominent white centers surround yellow signals. Blooms will average 8 inches in diameter and possess unusually fine substance. 4 feet. Pictured front cover.

AZURE RUFFLES Each \$10.00

Like ACCLAIM, this is another first in its color class. Not only elegantly ruffled with tufted center, this is our finest medium blue Marhigo. If you seek the bluest blue in *Iris kaempferi*, this is it! In fact most other blue varieties appear purple or lavender by comparison. The white centers and large golden spears make this gorgeous iris even more exciting. Very free flowering and a 2 or 3-year clump covered with 8 to 9-inch blooms is simply breathtaking. Very late. 4 feet. Pictured on front cover.

AUGUST EMPEROR Each \$7.50

An absolute self of deep reddish violet except for the small orange signals. The center is composed of exceptionally large petaloids. Similar to but larger than SUMMER STORM, the individual flowers will measure 9 to 10 inches across. The velvety texture and great substance both help to bear out the magnificence of the huge blossoms on stems up to 5 feet. Late. Pictured on front cover.

GAY GALLANT Each \$3.00

One of our most brilliant and colorful selections from the RIGOLETTO Series. Ground color is white with the bluest penciling of all. The remarkable feature however, is the center of inky blue-black styles. This sharp color contrast sets this Marhigo apart from all others and the perfectly rounded flowers of crisp flaring form are of medium size averaging about 7 inches in diameter. 4 feet. Midseason. Building a large stock before offering this seedling permits a modest introductory price. Picture page 6.

SUMMER GLORY Each \$3.00

Of all the marbled Marhigos we have introduced, this possesses the lightest color pattern creating a most dainty effect. Ground color is white with scattered reddish violet markings. The picture accurately portrays the color of the large flat flowers measuring 9 to 10 inches across. An early variety on stems up to 5 feet.

FALLING STAR Each \$7.50

Similar to but even lovelier than the old Higo variety Fuji-Gasumi. Purest white with just a touch of the blue sky in the central portion of the flowers. Of large opulent proportions, this iris has won the admiration of all who have seen it in our garden. Blooms averaging 9 inches in diameter come early on branched 3½ to 4-foot stems. Truly a beautiful Marhigo either in the garden or on the show table.

RAMPANT RIVER

This most difficult to describe Iris, due to its intricate color pattern, is a seedling out of REIGN OF GLORY and MIDSUMMER REVERIE. The color pattern is most unusual to say the least and this is the first of its color group we have offered. Reddish-purple is the dominant color with radial white lines extending almost to the edges. Showy yellow signals are set off by an egg white area peppered and striated red-purple. White styles are also tipped red-purple. A most charming feature are the crimped frilly outer portions of the floral segments. Medium size blooms on 4½ to 5-foot stems. Midseason.

# June and July Is Japanese Iris Time

A clear medium blue double very near delft blue, offspring of Irojiman x Shimei-no-aki. Except for some scattered white penciling the color resembles Irojiman, a very fine blue single. Crisp appearance marks the tailored quality of this iris. Medium 7-inch flowers open rather late on 3-foot stems.

BLUE GENTIAN (Marx 1959)

Like one of the Gentians for which it was named, this deep velvety blue iris might be called the blue counterpart of Heather Red because it is so similar in all respects except color. Flowers measure 7 to 8 inches across and hold their intense color unusually well even in hot weather. Very late. 30 inches. Picture page 5.

BLUE LAGOON (Morx 1954)

Clearest blue, a little deeper than sky blue, a beautiful color seldom seen in iris Kaempferi. The smartly cut 8-inch flowers smooth and without ruffling, come into bloom very early and continue for weeks on well-branched 3-foot stems.

**BLUE ORCHID** (Marx 1953)

A distinctive, enchanting flower that will stand out in any planting. The color is a bewitching shade of deep orchid lightly veined wine purple with wedge-shaped gold markings in the throat. The wide 8-inch flowers come early and last throughout the season. Height about 3 feet. Picture page 14.

**BLUE POMPON** (Marx 1955)

Our first introduction with a unique pompon center made up of many styles. The color is a uniform deep blue, a shade lighter than Hisakata, one of its parents. The large 8-inch ruffled flowers come late in the season on 3- to 31/2-foot stems. A treat for every connoisseur of Japanese Iris. Few plants to spare this year. Picture page 12.

CALICO MAID (Marx 1956)

Ordinarily, the marbled varieties do not match other colors for size, but this magnificent new marbled giant amazes all with its size as well as its beauty. Each bloom is a fountain of colors, from the rich (Canterbury) blue markings around the central golden signals to the lighter violet splotches on the outer portions. The entire ground color is pearly white. The massive double blooms are lightly ruffled and come rather late in the season. Larger and brighter than Nishiki-Gi. 3 to 31/2 feet.

The story of our Marhigo strain of Japanese Iris goes back to our hobby of collecting named Japanese Iris started over twenty years ago. In the process of trying to unravel the muddle of names, made even more insoluble by the addition of large U.S. and foreign collections, our emphasis shifted from the desire to arrive at an authenticated list of varieties for presentation to the public, to developing better Japanese Iris with new color patterns, more and clearer colors and with better branching, a trait not usually present in the Higo strain. The ultimate goal of our endeavor - a matchless collection of Japanese Iris representative of all types and colors and absolutely guaranteed for nomen-- has become a reality. As a result of our carefully controlled hybridizing program, we now offer a superior strain of Japanese Iris, known as MARHIGO IRIS. It will be as fascinating for you garden fanciers as it is for us to grow some of these pioneering MARHIGOS. We honestly be-

lieve that, no matter what you have seen, read or heard, if you will visit our gardens at blooming time you can expect to see AMERICA'S FINEST COLLECTION OF JAPANESE IRIS.

# **Marhigos** — Continued

COURT JESTER (Marx 1953) Each 2.00 A flower that fairly glitters in the garden. The colors are composed of a white ground veined deep blue with rich purple styles for contrast. Fully double flowers average 8 inches in diameter. Height 40 inches. Early to midseason. Picture page 14.

Soft bluish violet stippling over a white ground. Large pure white center and solid bluish violet on the outer portion of the flowers. The clear white styles are edged violet. Large 10-inch flowers, among the first to bloom. Three feet.

DRIVEN SNOW (Marx 1961) We never seem to grow enough of these beautiful snowy white Marhigos. This and SILVER WAVES introduced last year are quite distinct from the white varieties we introduced previously. As the picture portrays, a dominant feature of this beauty is the prominent center composed of many petaloids that seems to bub-ble up from the heart of each bloom. Large wavy flowers are fully double and possess extra good substance. Averages 8 to 9 inches. Midseason to late. 4 feet. Picture page 8.

EMBOSSED (Marx 1956)

Here is a Marhigo with precise clear cut features unmatched by any iris, except perhaps some of the Oncocyclus clan. The frilly white flowers shrouded in a network of sharp, well-defined veins of deepest (Pansy) blue, and the large tufted center of deepest royal purple tipped white, create a distinctive heraldic engraving effect. The double 6- to 7-inch flowers are exceptionally ruffled for this type. 31/2 to 4 feet. Midseason.

EMPEROR'S ROBE (Marx 1957)

Boldly ruffled, violet-veined double, this selection from the Rigoletto Series shows a light stippling of soft (near Roman) violet on white on the petals, intensified toward the edges. Sharp, dark violet veins (near imperial) extend over the whole petal area, forming an imposing backdrop to the dark violet semi-erect styles, contrasted by the deep-to-light orange brush-stroke signals. A flower of excellent substance which opens to 7 inches in diameter on 32-inch stems. One-way branching. Picture page 13.

FLYING-KITE Marx 1955)

This beautiful new white iris differs greatly from our earlier introductions, Great White Heron and Snowy Hills. The fully double, smooth horizontal blooms are not ruffled, and will appeal to those who prefer the formal flat type of Japanese Iris. Very tall stiff 4-foot stems. Midseason.

FROSTED PYRAMID (Marx 1960)

Our first truly double Marhigo introduction and perhaps the most beautiful Japanese Iris in our collection. We have grown a few imported double or "Peony Type" Higo varieties which cannot measure up to this exquisitely ruffled pure white Marhigo. The extra petals are more fully developed and more gracefully arranged in each blossom. In fact, when this seedling was first exhibited many visitors mistook it for a white peony or a rose. Half opened blooms do closely resemble the loveliest white hybrid tea roses. Here is truly a rare collector's item that will bring real prestige to the gardens of the most discriminating. Medium-size flowers on 36- to 40-inch stems. We have only a few plants to spare this year.

"A cotton fabric with blue and white stripes" given as a definition of the word Galatea, aptly suggests this unusual and fascinating new iris. We have grown hundreds of thousands of Marhigo iris seedlings and never have we seen another quite like GALATEA. The ground color is near flax blue sharply penciled white almost to the edges of the standards and falls. Pure white styles and petaloids accent the centers. The large draping 8- to 9-inch blooms are produced on 2-way branched 4-foot stems for 3 to 4 weeks. Truly an iris for the Kaempferi iris fancier who seeks something new and different. Picture on page 8.

Red, white and blue, a color combination rarely seen in the floral world. The upright standards are violet red, the falls bright medium blue, contrasted by pure white borders. A single of matchless form, unlike any other iris, and a splendid grower that will bloom profusely on well-branched stems over a long season. 3 to 31/2 feet. Picture page 12.

GIFT OF HEAVEN (Marx 1956)

An absolute self of soft powder blue (Vervain) without a trace of purple or orchid, a color very similar to some of the light blue shades of Delphinium Chinensis. The flowers are so extremely ruffled and full-centered that a half-opened flower looks very much like a big rosebud. Medium size blooms, 6 to 7 inches across, on branched 3-foot stems. A perfect charmer at blooming time. Midseason.

GREAT WHITE HERON (Marx 1953)

One of the very largest of all Japanese iris. A truly magnificent white iris which, with no coddling whatever, produces 11-inch flowers year after year. The immense semi-double flowers unfold atop tall 5-foot stems, resembling large white birds poised for flight. Foliage of graceful arching habit. Early to midseason. Picture page 1

GOOD OMEN (Marx 1956) Intensity of color, an unbelievable velvety sheen and huge size highlight this elegant Marhigo seedling. A self of deepest wine near (Imperial), at times with blackish luster in the summer sun. The 9- to 10-inch flowers are borne on 3-foot stems above low season. Picture page 6.

GUSTO (Marx 1954) Each 2.00 A dramatic sparkling beauty of rich deep blue. The flower is crisp and ruffled, with large white center and radial markings. Upright white styles tipped blue. Four to six large conspicuous blooms on 3- to 4-foot stems of ideal three-way branching. Midseason to late.

HALL OF MARBLE (Marx 1956)

We think the name Hall of Marble aptly applies to this seedling because of the varied color patterns apparent in all blooms. The ground color is off-white, near pale blue, more or less marbled Royal Purple over the center portion and shading to violet markings on the outer areas of the flower. The upright white styles are stippled violet. Ruffled 7-inch flowers above stiff foliage on 3- to 31/6-foot stems. Midseason to late.

HEATHER RED (Marx 1959)

This fine reddish purple was selected not only for its nice ruffled form and excellent substance but also for its late flowering season. After the other red varieties are about past this richly hued beauty takes the stage. A perfect companion for Blue Gentian as both bloom together and are about the same height, 30 inches. Picture page 5.

IMPERIAL PALACE (Morx 1955)

A huge velvety beet red on unusually well-branched stem with as many as 3 fully double 10-inch flowers open at once! Unlike most red varieties it has resisted sunburn much better due to superior substance. A robust grower and extremely free blooming. Established clumps are literally covered with flowers. Midseason to late. 4 feet. Picture page 12.

IMPERIAL VELVET (Marx 1953) This uniformly purplish-red flower opens deep velvety red purple and gradually changes to a lighter tone near crimson or beetred. The blooms endure the hottest July weather without flagging. Of flaring form and opulent proportions, the fully double 7-inch flowers are produced over a long season. Well branched 40-inch stems bearing 4 to 5 flowers. Midseason. Picture page 13.

This is one of the most distinctive seedlings selected from our Butterfly Series. The crisp, flaring white flowers have falls and standards edged dark reddish violet (Patriarch) with an occasional speckling inside the colored borders. Medium-size double blooms held well above erect foliage on 3-foot stems. Midseason.

KING'S COURT (Marx 1961)

The courtly glitter, color and pomp of the most extravagant royal palaces might symbolize this velvety rich hued massive flower. Similar to but much larger than BRILLIANT BURGUNDY and comes into bloom at the very end of the season rather than the beginning. Color is rich beet red with some white veining. Large white styles are also tipped beet red. Another prodigious bloomer and a clump of 10 to 11 flowers is something to remember. We recommend this one to any fancier looking for the ultimate in this color class. Very late. 41/2 to 5 feet. Picture page 8.

KNIGHT IN ARMOR (Marx 1959) One of the finest of scores of selected Warai Hotei seedlings. Ground color is light blue veined deep royal purple, The central portion is made up of many purple petaloids. The ruffled flowers of stiff substance come very late in the season making it most valuable for prolonging the blooming season. 4-ft. branched stems.

LADY IN WAITING (Marx 1957)

Beautiful large white double with a most delicate pink border. The white petals are edged with a narrow margin of lavender pink, close to true orchid, while the flat styles are white with orchid tips of the same hue. The 7-inch flower, rather large for its type, is slightly but exquisitely ruffled and of fine substance, which is reflected in the crisp bearing and the refined manner of the whole bloom. 32 inches tall. One- to two-way branching. Midseason to late. Picture on page 12.

MAGIC LANTERN (Marx 1954)

A winsome iris, sure to engage the fancier's attention because there is nothing else like it. The salient features are the brushed red purple tips of both standards and falls, just as if each petal had been dipped in liquid paint. Ground color is pale lavender or off white, softly veined rose purple. A most intriguing and fascinating iris. Medium size double of flaring form. 31/2 feet. Midseason. Picture page 6.

MAUVE OPERA (Marx 1954)

Massive orchid with scattered purple penciling. Soft lilac styles and prominent yellow signals. Most beautiful exhibition variety and much larger than others in this color class. Flaring double 10-inch flowers are copiously produced on strong 4-foot stems.

MAMMOTH MARVEL (Marx 1959) Each 3.00 One of, if not the largest, Marhigos we have introduced to date. Color pattern is white with uniform medium blue veining. Styles are blue edged in white. The lightly ruffled flowers will measure II inches across on well grown established plants. A seedling of Osmaru-Miyo, but larger and taller on 4½-foot stems. Branched stems produce 4 to 6 flowers each. Early to midseason.

MIDNIGHT WHISPER (Marx 1957) Large double blue-violet blend. The shading varies from light (near Columbine) blue around the gold signals to a blue near (Campanula) violet on the outer edges of the petals. Delicate white veins radiate from the signals and break through the darker petal color merging with the decidedly paler border all around the rim. The white flat styles, too, show a faint edging of Campanula. The 8-inch flower appears quite flat with just a hint of ruffling. Good substance. 38 inches high. One-way branching. Picture page 7.

**MOUNTAIN GROTTO** (Marx 1953) Medium blue blend near cattleya orchid is the general color of this enchanting flower. White upright styles trimmed in lavender and bright yellow signals add vivacity. Graceful 8-inch blooms of semi-flaring form are produced on well branched 4-foot stems. Very early double.

MYSTIC BUDDHA (Marx 1956) A colorful single flower of scintillating beauty and eye-arresting profile, selected from our Butterfly Series for its brilliant color pattern and perfect form. The falls are snowy white with broad wine red borders and dense stippling over all but the central portion. Rigidly erect standards are also of purest white edged red purple, and the white styles are similarly tipped. Flowers up to 7 inches across are carried high above the attractive arching foliage. Superior styling and color appeal. Early to mid-season. 3 feet. Picture page 14.

OCEAN MIST (Marx 1953) A most engaging blue iris, and one we like better every year. It is a soft sky blue except for the margins which are shaded deeper hues of violet blue. Prominent white centers and spreading white styles tipped blue add charm and interest to this mysterious regal flower. Large double 8-inch blooms on 3-foot stems. Midseason. Picture page 13.

ORCHID FAWN (Marx 1954)

Beautiful orchid shaded fawn brown. The illustration shows the color accurately. In the garden this variety always attracts attention. And under artificial light it is a subject of incomparable beauty. The flowers are of medium size. Height 3 to 4 feet.

**OVER THE WAVES (Marx 1955)** One of our most intensely ruffled iris which has been drawing tremendous attention ever since it was first exhibited. A selection from our Butterfly Series, the color is white with light purple borders and little stippling inside. Fully tufted centers with extra styles and petaloids add to the charm of this most distinctive iris. Quite unlike anything else we list and sure to appeal to those with an artistic flare. Midseason to late. 4 feet. Picture page 4.

PASTEL PRINCESS (Marx 1956)

Selected from our Manon Series for its most delicate pastel shade of orchid. The color is almost white by comparison to other pinks and tends more towards true lavender. Its soft tints are suggestive of fragility and translucence yet the flower posseses won-derful substance and finest texture. Wide petaled and flaring, the 7-inch blooms are ideally proportioned and will please those who delight in delicate colors. Midseason. 3 feet. Picture page 11.

PEACOCK DANCE (Marx 1955)

Those who look for the bizarre should love this brilliant iris of striking color contrasts. Immense falls of attractive form with large showy erect standards give this flower a unique personality. The standards are deep red and purple, the expansive falls pure white finely penciled plum purple. It blooms early to midseason on 3-foot stems. Picture on page 2.

PINK FROST (Marx 1954)

An enchanting light pink unlike any other of the hundreds of pink seedlings that bloom here each year. The color is just a shade lighter than WORLD'S DELIGHT and the whole flower is intensely ruffled. Waved, somewhat pointed falls create a novel effect in profile. Double 8-inch flowers. 31/2 feet. Picture page 12.

PIN STRIPE (Marx 1954)

A most refined, delicately veined selection, superior in every way. The color pattern is sharp and clear: Pure white ground penciled bright blue with tufted centers of white styles and petaloids brushed blue violet. The 4-foot stems are well branched and bear 4 to 5 flowers in midseason.

REIGN OF GLORY (Marx 1953)

A rare beauty for those who seek the ultimate in charm and exquisite color pattern. At first glance the flower might be described as silvery blue but close inspection reveals a most intricate network of fine delicate stippling and reticulations of sky blue over a white ground. This color scheme is intensified towards the outer margins, which are solid violet blue. Fully double 8- to 9-inch flowers on well-branched stems produced over a long period. Height 40 inches. Midseason. Picture page 6.

ROSE PRELUDE (Marx 1960)

We have achieved the nearest approach to deep rose-pink in this charming new Marhigo. The uniform color is just a shade lighter than our earlier introduction Majestic Mountain, which is sold out until 1963. The picture illustrates the lovely color faithfully as well as the value of this beauty in large bouquets or mixed arrangements. Rose Prelude flowers most abundantly from early to midseason. 3 feet. Picture page 4.

ROSE TOWER (Marx 1955) One of our very finest introductions. Ten-inch flowers of lighter hue than GIANT CARMEN and IMPERIAL VELVET, near rose red. Prominent white centers and orange signals enliven the color. Of wonderful substance and texture, the big ruffled blooms on sturdy 4-foot stems always command attention. Midseason. Picture page 11.

ROYAL CROWN (Marx 1961) Adjectives become harder and harder to find for describing these gorgeous New Marhigos. A magnificent red and white selection that differs from others in its color class because the beet red border is much wider than in any other one we have introduced to date. Additional qualities are extra fine texture and heavy substance of the blooms. Crested white centers composed of several thick white petaloids give an overall solid appearance. This is our first introduction in a bicolor group that might be termed "half and half." One of the last to bloom.  $4\frac{1}{2}$  to 5 feet. Picture page 8.

ROYAL PAGEANT (Marx 1955) Our high regard for old ROSE ANNA as a breeder has resulted in hundreds of richly colored seedlings with darker veining. Royal Pageant, among the very largest in its color class, is one of the first to open and surprisingly remains in flower with the very latest varieties. The ground color is pale mauve sharply veined deep red purple. Dark purple styles and golden signals add interest and contrast. Well branched 4-foot stems usually bear 6 flowers each.

SEA TITAN (Marx 1957) Our largest blue Marhigo. A light (near Veronica) blue emanates from around the golden signals and gradually merges into a very light purple getting more solid toward the petal edges (near Damson). The same light blue to light violet tones are repeated in the erect styles. The light to moderately ruffled petals hold up beautifully due to good substance and display the 10-inch bloom to greatest advantage. Various stems grow 4 feet with occasional oneway branching. Midseason. Picture page 4.

SILVER WAVES (Marx 1961) The largest double pure white Marhigo iris we list. The wide expansive flowers actually attain 11-inch diameters under ideal conditions. Of smoothest texture and rather flat form this magnificent Marhigo will appeal to those preferring the more formal type of Japanese Iris. For a dramatic garden display, plant any one of these white Marhigos with the dark purple varieties like SUM-MER STORM and POMP AND CIRCUMSTANCES. SILVER WAVES is produced on stiff, slender 41/2-foot stems. Midseason.

SILKEN PARASOL (Morx 1956)

We rank this superb new iris as one of the very finest Marhigos we have developed, and our best and largest medium blue double. A most beautiful shade of silvery blue with delicate violet shadings on the margins. Full-bodied flowers up to 9 inches across are produced in greatest profusion from the beginning to the end of the season. About 31/2 feet.

SNOWY HILLS (Marx 1954) A snowy white flower with an all-around frilly rim and golden rays emanating from the center of the bloom. A superior iris of large size, excellent form and great height. In fact several fanciers consider this to be our best double white to date. Wonderful substance. Midseason. 4 feet. Picture page 5.

WOODLAND BROOK (Marx 1959)

As the color picture accurately shows, we have here a distinct color perhaps best described as violet blue. An absolute self possessing substance and texture that has commanded superlative appraisal every year since its maiden bloom in 1955. The opulent flowers are extra wide petaled and average 9 inches or more in diameter. Picture page 5. WORLD'S DELIGHT (Marx 1953)

One of the milestones on the way to the perfect pink. We have here a uniform light orchid pink without a trace of blue. Even the styles are shaded pink and the yellow spears are of minimum size. Three to four double 7-inch flowers on 40-inch stems are



**CULTURE:** Tall Bearded Iris can be grown with excellent results in any fertile soil that has reasonable drainage. Whether the soil is neutral, slightly acid or contains lime, makes little or no difference. But sunlight is indispensable. The plants should be so set out that the root (rhizome) is barely underground. If soil is dry at planting time, a thorough soaking is beneficial, but once the plants become established, they require very little moisture after blooming. When the plants become too crowded or decrease their flowering, they should be divided. Bearded Iris will grow but not bloom properly in shaded locations.

## for June to September Bloom

THE MODERN DAYLILY can hardly be compared with its forebearers of 20 to 25 years ago. When numerous American hybridizers turned their attention to this splendid perennial during the 1930's amazing results soon became evident. New colors including pinks, red, purples and intermediate shades, unknown to the average gardener, were developed until now only a white and blue daylily have yet to become a reality. Also new gorgeous yellow shades represent so much improvement over the older varieties. And in addition to the existing new colors we have now better flowers that are elegantly formed and longer lasting, increased and superior stem branching, and best of all, everblooming tendencies are now to be found in many varieties.

Daylilies will grow anywhere and do equally well in the extremely southern and most northerly parts of the country. They are permanent perennials which we unreservedly recommend to any one. They withstand drouth, excessive moisture, sun or shade, any kind of soil and will bloom under any and all of these conditions. We know of no other perennial for which we can make so many claims.

CULTURE: Hemerocallis will grow and bloom in almost any soil and in all parts of the country. They will bloom in full shade or sun but are at their best with afternoon shade as the very hot sun will fade the flowers somewhat. They are truly a lazy man's flower because once planted they will take care of themselves. Daylilies may be transplanted any time but preferably in early Spring or Fall after blooming.

#### SHIPMENT: Any time from early Spring to late Fall.

ANNE DODSON (Buck 1955) Each 2.00; 3 for 5.00 Deep golden yellow with garnet brown eye zone. Cluster of medium sized flowers present a brilliant effect. Reblooming tendency. Evergreen. 31/2 feet. June-July.

#### **BLACK GREMLINS (Marx 1957)**

And their unique color gives them a most vivacious air. The dominant color is a dark mahogany with a near-black eye zone and vivid tinges of orange, stealing occasionally out into the dark petal areas, warming the somber mahogany with a glowing warmth. Rather dwarf, averaging 2 to 2½ feet. Midseason.

BORDER KING (Marx 1961)

This gorgeous blend is not only the largest of all Daylilies but is also one of the most beautiful we have ever seen. Color is very near Coral (Maerz and Paul) with a large cherry red eye zone, and rather inconspicuous yellow throat. Flowers are lightly ruffled and measure up to 8 or 9 inches across. Plants are large and robust, producing branched flower scapes up to 4 feet in height. In full bloom in July and August. Truly a spectacular Daylily which we can heartily recommend to anyone. Also the parent of some of the most impressive new seedlings in our test plots. Picture page 40.

**BROCADE** (Taylor) Each 1.00; 3 for 2.00

A charming offspring of the lovely old PRIMA DONNA, of smooth texture and large size. It is amber rose with darker veining, the eye zone accenting the throat of golden yellow. Well branched and floriferous. 3 feet. AM 1956.

BURNT SUGAR (Milliken 1951)

Aptly named, the large flowers are of good substance and are a self of smooth, sunburned honey tan. Evergreen. 36 inches.

CAPISTRANO (Milliken) Each .85; 3 for 2.00
Huge bright yellow with light brown dusting in throat and strongly reflexed petals. Very early. Fragrant evening bloomer. 4 to 5 feet. Evergreen.

CAPRI (Milliken)

A favorite of many gardeners. Pale rosy apricot with exceptionally wide petals and sepals, both heavily creped and delicately ruffled. The flowers are medium large of extra heavy substance, open wide, but do not reflex to any great extent. A very strong grower. 2½ to 3 feet. HM 1956.

Medium red with just a hint of blue. The unusually broad petals overlap the sepals and they both reflex to such a degree that the flower appears perfectly round. A shallow yellow throat is the only accent. 3 feet.

COPPER SUNSET (Marx 1956)

An exciting new flower without peer. The brilliant copper-red petals and bright copper sepals are intensified by their luminous ivory midribs and the golden yellow center. Five inch flowers are borne in abundance in July and August on well branched 21/2 foot stems.

A most intriguing novelty is this rare shade of pinkish salmon softened by a faint suffusion of cream. Add the clear silvery margins and cherry red eye zone, and you have a most beautiful daylily. Of robust habit, the strong well branched 4-foot stems bear many flowers for almost 2 months during June and July. A gorgeous daylily and definitely pinker than most in this color class.



GOLDEN GATE (Christenson)

Close to the largest pale yellow daylily we have seen. Wide petaling and heavy blooming traits insure a colorful planting in your border. 30 inches. HM 1955.

GREEN EYED GIANT (Marx 1956)

A most unusual, glittering flower of charming yellow and chocolate brown with a pronounced green throat, measuring 5 to 6 inches across. Of excellent substance, the sweetly scented flowers are produced all summer long from July to October. Best planted towards the front of the border where its reblooming habit and rather short stems can display the blooms to best advantage. Picture p. 38.

Without question too many orange Daylilies have been introduced, but here is a new orange-yellow of distinct form, extreme color depth and substance unequalled by any other Daylily we grow. In addition, each sepal is marked with an outer green midrib which contributes to the unusual thickness and stiff substance of the floral segments. Color is deepest orange, in fact, deeper and richer than other orange varieties. The extremely recurved lily-like flowers are carried on strong stems towering up to 51/2 to 6 feet. Every scape is generously branched with continuous bloom for 8 weeks or more in late summer. Picture page 40.

GRISELLE (Saxton 1948)

Very wide, reflexed petals in bright raspberry rose, are in the warmer climates, a warm rose pink. Midseason. 32 inches. Evergreen. AM 1956.

Warm apricot yellow and a cherry red center for contrast. The surface appears to be sprinkled with gold dust, adding much luster to the flower. Wide petaled and recurved large blooms face up and outward in a most pleasing manner. Well-branched stems 2½ to 3 feet in height. July-August.

HEARTH FIRE

A beautiful wide petaled and large size. We consider it one of the very finest red daylilies in our collection. 3 feet. Midseason.

HER LADYSHIP (Marx 1954)

MEADOWSWEET (Taylor 1953)

The closest approach to white for a Daylily. In great demand everywhere. Very late. 31/2 feet.

OLYMPUS (Wheeler)

A large, very pale orange with a glistening of peach dusting. Wide and of good substance. Remontant.

ORCHID ROSE (Marx 1956)

PAINTED LADY (Russell)

The famous daylily of gigantic size already has a remarkable record of breeding superior seedlings. The 8 to 9-inch flowers of apricot yellow are dusted cinnamon red. Wide ruffled petals. One of Mr. Russell's finest varieties. 3½ feet. July-August. Stout Medal 1951.

PARTY GOWN (Milliken) Each .85; 3 for 2.00 A very pleasing bicolor with soft yellow petals and sepals. The petals are creped and the outer half is heavily washed with a warm mineral red. 21/2 to 3 feet. Early and repeats. HM 1952

#### **TWO NEW 1962 INTRODUCTIONS**

ALERT (Breithaupt 1962)

Near dwarf and bright deep crimson and blooms for a good long time. The plants average about 15 to 18 inches high and bloom from mid-August well into October, with prime peak near mid-September. This new beauty is a splendid accent ornamental and lovely in a red, white and blue combination with dwarf Oregon Asters CARARRA and SERENADE as pictured above.

OCTOBER SNOW (Breithaupt 1962)

Semi-dwarf and extra late flowering, with large snow-white blooms quite double and formal. The plants grow about 25 inches high and almost as wide; compact and vigorous. They bloom from late in September into November and most profusely near mid-October. As a specimen plant, it is very attractive in the autumn garden and excellent when used for edgings along walks or driveways facing beds of garden chrysanthemums.

#### PREVIOUS INTRODUCTIONS

**BONNY BLUE** (Breithaupt 1957)

Divisions should be taken for new plants each year. PURPLE PRELUDE (Breithaupt 1960) One of the earliest and most colorful of all Dwarf Asters. The color is intense reddish violet unlike any other variety. In addition blooms are produced continuously from early August into October. 



CULTURE: Perennial hardy asters require only moderately fertile soil. They are exceedingly hardy and few pests bother them. They may be planted about 18 to 24 inches apart and do best in the full sun with plenty of moisture. The clumps should not be allowed to become too large. When they do or appear crowded, divide them down to teacupsize or smaller, taking the new plants from the outside and discarding the old centers. A single new shoot will make a fine flowering plant by autumn time.





CULTURE: Rich soil with lots of leaf mold or well rotted manure is best. Hellebores prefer shade, especially in summer, and should never be exposed to full sun in the warmer dry sections of the country. Once planted, Hellebores may remain undisturbed for years in the same manner as their relative, the peony. When old clumps are transplanted, they should be divided down to single crowns with as much of the roots intact as possible.





culture: Primroses will not endure excessive heat nor extreme aridity. Neither will they withstand sub-zero temperatures without protection. With few exceptions they prefer a deep fertile soil that is cool and moisture retentive. In the Pacific Northwest primroses are successfully grown in full sun but for most sections of the country we advise considerable shade.

SHIPMENT: Spring or Fall. Plants shipped from March to May will be in bud or flower.






