President's Report

Just What is a Strategic Plan?

Your Board, in an effort to be forward thinking and plan for the future of our community, has embarked on a process of a creating a strategic plan. With the help of our residents we will put together a plan that will help us meet the needs of our community as we go forward.

A strategic plan is the process of defining a strategy, and a direction the community chooses to go, so it can refocus some of its resources to accomplish this strategy.

Done properly, this type of planning can be quite extensive, it usually boils down to a few simple questions such as: What do we want to do? How does the cost vs benefit affect the community as a whole? How do we accomplish it and how and when do we pay for it?

In many communities a plan like this could cover the next year and in most cases the next three to seven years. Some plans even go out as far as twenty years. The plan, when completed, is not set in stone. There are too many variables which could affect in the unforeseen future. It would give us a focus, however, and a long range concept to work towards.

The Board as a whole will decide how we accomplish this process but I present here some ideas.

General Sessions would be held open to all residents. In addition we might meet with Clubs and our Advisory Committees. We might have some focus groups and may even do some surveys. The following might be sample survey questions:

Recreation Benefits Desired? Frequency of Recreation Facility Usage? Facility Most Often Used in Last Year? Frequency of Recreation Activities Participation? Activity Participation Location, Frequency of Indoor Recreation Facility Use? Indoor Facility Participation Location? Overall Recreation Facilities/Programs Satisfaction? New Recreation Facility Desired? Probable Use of Proposed New Facilities? Need for Proposed Facility Improvements? Facility Most in Need of Improvement? New Recreation Program Desired?

It's not just amenity usage we would be looking at. There could be ideas on conservation programs as well as many other concepts that would better our development. Ideas might range from small items like an additional park bench to a larger one like additions to the clubhouse.

We might even want to start a marketing program just for SCSH. Wouldn't it be nice if after the developer has finished, there was such a demand for our community that our property values increased? In the end we should have at least a hundred items, if not more, to review.

After gathering all possible ideas, feedback and concerns, we would start to rate that information within four categories which would look something like this:

• Demand = 35%

Accommodates recreation activities that are in demand or anticipates future needs of the community.

- Location and Access = 25%
 Provides appropriate ease of access. Creates synergies with nearby recreation uses.
- Quality = 20%
 Competes with other facilities, compares with other retirement communities, provides an inviting, comfortable facility.
- Future Costs = 20% Minimizes expected future maintenance and operational costs. Provides opportunity for external revenue stream. Provides flexibility to accommodate changing needs.

Now to scoring. One might score possible ideas, feedback, and concerns within the four categories with a rating from 1-5 with the highest number meeting the most needs and the lowest number meeting the least needs. In the end you would have a total score that might prioritize your list.

Remember, this is just one concept. There are many others the Board may consider. In the end we should have a prioritized list of items with which the majority of our residents feel we should move forward. This is not a quick fix process. If done properly, it will take a lot of time.

Treasurer's Finance and Variance Report

Cash Balances in the Operating Accounts total \$1,834,449 and in the Reserve Accounts total \$9,715,493. All balances are invested according to the Sun

City Shadow Hills approved Investment Policy.


Total combined revenue for the month was \$1,303,097. This includes assessment payments in the amount of \$735,847 and combined taxable income from all other sources in the amount of \$567,250.

Total Food & Beverage Department expenses were \$10,032 over budget for the first eleven months of the year.


For the Fiscal Year to date, General & Administrative expenses were under budget \$210,163, Recreation expenses were over budget \$15,405, Fitness was under budget \$47,636, Landscape Maintenance was under budget \$10,713, Maintenance was under budget \$32,863, Property Protection was over budget \$40,766, Utilities were under budget \$19,864, and Golf was over budget \$428,070. All of these figures reflect the year-to-date amounts from operations through the end of November 2014.

Total Year-to-Date Expenses were \$193,993 over budget on a year-to-date expense projection of \$8,979,548. The 2014 Actual Total Year-to-Date Expenses were \$9,173,541, versus \$8,692,337 in 2013.

The cumulative total equity since inception of Sun City Shadow Hills is \$2,336,542, which includes fixed assets of \$436,107.

From the General Manager

To Reserve or Not To Reserve

One of the primary business duties of the Board of Directors is maintaining and preserving property values. To do this properly, an association must develop funding plans for future repair, renovation, or replacement of major commonarea components such as roofs, boilers, sidewalks, swimming pool components, buildings, fairways, asphalt surfaces, decks, and more.

An association has several funding options including periodic assessments over the life of assets, special assessments at the time of replacement, borrowing funds when needed, a combination of the above, or the most common method and the one we use here at SCSH (and in some states the only lawful one): setting aside monies in what is commonly called reserve funds, replacement reserves, replacement funds, or simply reserves. A reserve fund is established by a reserve study.

A reserve study is a complex document that projects when numerous components—like the clubhouse roof, parking lots, or tennis courts—will need to be repaired, renovated, or replaced; what they will cost; and how much we need to set aside each year to pay for the various components at the necessary time. Preparing a reserve study requires a unique combination of specialized engineering knowledge, a keen understanding of financial projections; and savvy investing skills.

Professional reserve study providers are extensively trained before they are considered qualified to perform competent reserve studies tailored for each community. These professionals have met stringent requirements and are held to high standards. They have a thorough knowledge of common interest developments and can provide the Board with sound guidance.

Reserve funds aren't an extra expense—they just spread out expenses more evenly. There are

other important reasons we put association monies into reserves every month:

- 1. Reserve funds meet legal, fiduciary, and professional requirements. A reserve fund is required by:
 - a. any secondary mortgage market in which the association participates (e.g., Fannie Mae, Freddie Mac, FHA, VA).
 - b. state statutes and/or regulations.
 - c. the community's governing documents.
- 2. Reserve funds provide for major repairs, renovations, and replacements that we know will be necessary at some point in time. Although a clubhouse roof may be replaced when it is 25 years old, every owner should share in its replacement costs.
- 3. Reserve funds minimize the need for special assessments or borrowing.
- 4. Reserve funds enhance resale values. Lenders and real estate agents are aware of the ramifications for new buyers if the reserves are inadequate. Many states require associations to disclose the amounts in their reserve funds to prospective purchasers.
- 5. The American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA) requires the community association to disclose its reserve funds in its financial statements.
- 6. Having a healthy reserve fund is proof that the community is looking into the future and preparing for large asset replacements that, if not planned for, could result in large special assessments.

In California there is no statutory requirement for associations to fund their reserves at any particular threshold; however, the state does require that associations conduct a full and complete reserve study with a site inspection of components once every three years and update the reserve study annually, which we do.



According to data gathered by the California Association of Community Managers, 44% of associations are under the 50% funded mark, while 43% are above and a small percentage, 13%, are at the "ideal" 100% and above mark.



SCSH's Board of Directors has elected to fund your reserves at the 97% mark for 2015 without an increase to your monthly assessments by using funds saved in other areas. This funding mark is at the 19% higher percentage level and very close to the "ideal" 100% funding mark.

Your Board should be congratulated for achieving this funding percentage.



Design Review Committee (DRC)

When you submit an application for a home improvement to the HOA, you will receive a green permit card with your application when you pick it up after it has been approved. This permit must be displayed near your front door or in a front window visible from the street during the improvement/construction period. This same green card must be returned to the HOA office, signed and dated after you complete your project, to let the HOA know that you have finished. Within one or two weeks, a member of the Design Review Committee will inspect your project to ensure that you completed it as it was approved.

Sometimes you may decide not to complete an item in your plan or wish to change something or add an item as construction proceeds. Call Vanessa at the HOA and tell her what you want to do, and she will help you. If you decide not to do something, note it on your green card when you turn it in or tell Vanessa. We usually notice when you add something to the plan, especially a swimming pool.

Block walls visible from the street that are losing paint are the responsibility of the homeowner. This includes walls along the side of the street. In phases one and two, this is starting to be a problem. The irrigation along the wall is hitting it, and eventually the paint starts peeling off. To use the correct color code, stop in the HOA office for help.

Besides the seven official members of the committee, there are many who regularly come to meetings, trainings, and have taken on necessary jobs. Some of those jobs are: Street Leader, Division Leader, Communication Helper, Logistic Helper, Volunteer Coordinator, and many others.

Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training is a positive and realistic approach to handling emergency and disaster situations. CERT promotes readiness, self-sufficiency, teamwork, rescuer safety, and doing the greatest good for the greatest number of people. Students learn how to organize themselves during a disaster, manage utilities, extinguish small fires, search for and rescue survivors, and provide basic disaster medical care.



CERT training is a <u>free</u> 20 hour class, delivered over the course of three days. Only those who complete the 20 hour training, including practical exercises with hands-on instruction, will receive a certificate of completion and <u>free</u> CERT kit. Class size is limited to the first 40 people who resister.



Are There Such Things As Miracles?

It was Thursday, November 11, 1965. I will never forget that day. It started out as just another lovely fall day in Denver, Colorado. The leaves on the trees were turning an amber and golden color. Nothing signaled that this day would be imprinted in my heart and memory forever.

Just two days previously, I had gathered around the kitchen table with my two roommates, also United Airlines stewardesses like me. We were horrified at the news in our local newspaper. On the front page was a frightening account of an American Airlines Boeing 727 jet that had crashed into a hillside on its approach to the Greater Cincinnati airport, killing 58 of the 62 persons aboard. One of my roommates observed, "Airplane crashes come in threes." This was the second after a United 727 had crashed into Lake Michigan on August 16, about

three months earlier, with no survivors. We all exclaimed that we hoped we wouldn't be on the third plane.

That Thursday evening, I was scheduled to work a turnaround flight to San Francisco (SFO), with an en route stop at Salt Lake City (SLC). I was looking forward to calling my boyfriend Ron when my flight landed at SFO.

He had invited me to Saturday's big Stanford – Berkeley football game and now, having successfully traded my upcoming weekend flights, I would be able to attend.

My flight, #227, departed Denver on time with three pilots, two other stewardesses, and me plus 83 passengers. It was a short flight from DEN to SLC. After completing the in-flight service, I took my place in the aft jumpseat. The "fasten seat belt" sign was illuminated. My mind was on calling my boyfriend when we arrived in SFO.

Then, suddenly, a strange thought popped into my head: "You aren't going to make it to SFO." I remember thinking, "How weird. Why not? The weather is good." Then I noticed it was so quiet! We had been descending without any noise from the three aft engines, and then I heard a loud roar from the engines just as we hit, 300 feet short of the runway.

We hit so hard that my hat flew off. The right landing gear broke into the aircraft, severing the electrical and fuel lines. Fire erupted threes row up from me. The cabin was pitch black with bellowing smoke and flames. I felt as if I had just turned on the TV to the climax of the film *Burning Inferno*. "These things happen in the movies or to other people," I thought, "how could this be happening to me?" I was stunned!

The aircraft was swerving down the runway as all my emergency training kicked in. I started yelling instructions to the passengers: "Seat belts tight, grab your ankles, stay in your seat until the plane comes to a complete stop." I became a robot. Two men stood in front of me asking, "Is this an exit? Can we get out this way?" I replied, "I must stay in my seat until the plane comes to a complete stop."

Finally, the aircraft halted. I opened the door to the stairwell. Simultaneously, a fire in the back exploded, burning my hands and face. My hair was on fire. I put it out with the palm of my right hand. My responsibility was to lower the aft stairs and evacuate passengers through that exit. However, the landing gear had broken off and the stairs were now flat on the ground.

My next task was to assist at another exit. By this time, the plane was a solid mass of fire and smoke. We were taught never to go through such an inferno. If you did and couldn't hold your breath, you would surely die. I was 21 years of age, and I wanted to contemplate my life before I met my Maker.

I curled up into a ball behind two men on the stair, breathing through my jacket. The smoke was so thick. Tears were running down my cheeks as my life flashed before my eyes. I saw what a happy life I had had. How could I begrudge dying now when so many people could live to be 80 and not be so fortunate? I saw my funeral with my friends and family mourning me, but also saw how quickly my memory would fade.

As I brushed my tears away, I felt my burnt face. I remembered I had told God, "If I were ever badly disfigured, I wouldn't want to live." Now, I told God, "I take it back!" As long as I had eyes to see the beauty of His world, I wanted to live. I knew there was no way for us to get out of this aircraft, but I prayed for a miracle. "God, if there are such things, please do one now."

At that instant, my adrenaline kicked in. I told the two men to make as much noise as possible. If the firemen knew where we were, maybe there was something they could do. The fire was coming down the stairs licking at my legs. I squeezed between the two men and found an opening, an inch high along the bottom of the stairs. I stuck my hand through it and, as God would have it, a fireman saw my hand and started shooting foam. Later, I learned they had given up hope that there were others still alive in the aircraft.

Are there such things as miracles? I think so! Thank you, God!



Alzheimer's: So Many Fears as We Age

On Pluto: Inside the Mind of Alzheimer's by Greg O'Brien

Some of you may remember a time when we didn't say the word "cancer." Our parents called it the "C," or said someone was "really sick" as they whispered about the person who had cancer. Cancer was feared because there was so little understanding of it. Today, that word of fear for our generation is "Alzheimer's." Before reading this book, I feared to speak the word, to discuss it, even to read about it. When someone we know has a form of dementia, we speak softly of them, with pity, "Oh, so sad," "Poor thing."

I am very fearful of Alzheimer's because I have had two generations of aunts and uncles who eventually died of early onset Alzheimer's. As a youngster, I remember being sent down the street with a coat to put on my Great Aunt Annie, who was walking the block naked. Her sister, Aunt Nell, as I remember her, was often on Pluto. Then there was Uncle Joe who developed it when he was 59 and lived all those years on Pluto until he died at 90. Among my six siblings, there is a continuous running accusation if someone does something stupid, "He's the one. She's got it." So it's evident we all fear that we will be the one. Well, it's too late for early onset but what about the other kind?

My brother Joe tackled the fear and recommended that I read the book On Pluto by Greg O'Brien. O'Brien's mother and maternal grandfather both had early onset Alzheimer's, and he was always aware that he could certainly be attacked by the dreaded disease. In his late fifties, he began to forget, not in the way that "oldtimers" strikes us but in much more serious ways. As a writer and journalist, O'Brien often found himself in the role of consultant to corporations. He would attend meetings and not remember why he was there. Or during the meeting he would totally blank out and not recognize any of the people in the room. At one point he was to meet his brother-in-law in the airport, and he did not recognize him.

Because O'Brien found so little written about

what Alzheimer's patients actually experience — their feelings, their fears, their behaviors — he began to record what he was experiencing. While his mother was alive, he would discuss with her what they were living through, his early stages and her later stages. From these conversations, he knew what was in his future. It was through these conversations that he understood what it meant when his mind left reality and landed on Pluto.

I found this description of O'Brien's Alzheimer's journey to be especially enlightening, not only for what to expect if I begin going to Pluto but what I can do when someone I love and care for has the disease. With the latter, he or she is not always on Pluto, may not recognize, and often hides what is happening to him or her. We are all familiar with the short-term memory loss indicator. But Alzheimer's is much more than the memory loss we all experience. Depression, isolation, physical imbalance and, in some, aggression as well as leaving reality are other symptoms.

O'Brien has given me some comfort that, so far, my memory loss is probably just normal aging. The difficulty with recalling names (a condition called anomia which affects all of us beginning in our early forties) is my number one problem, and perhaps it is yours. In addition, many times I don't remember what I came to the kitchen for, or why my car keys are not in my purse. When I lose a train of thought in the middle of a conversation, I am greatly embarrassed. But clearly, at this stage, this is not Alzheimer's. As I age, it might develop into some serious form of dementia but, for now, I am content to have conquered my fear of even saying the word.

If you would like to gain greater understanding of your own aging process, or of loved ones with

Alzheimer's, I recommend that you read *On Pluto*.

Great Hotels of the World

From the days of the caravansaries in the Middle and Far East – the Persian Royal Road and the Silk Road – which supported a network of rest stops for long distance travelers, to the grand hotels of the British Empire, and today's modern luxury chains, hotels are a big part of the lure and adventure of travel. A list of the top hotels for 2013 by *Travel and Leisure* includes:

- 1. Mombo Camp (nine tents) in the Morem Game Reserve, Botswana.
- 2. Castillo diCasole (41 rustic suites), an estate in Tuscany, Italy.
- 3. Lebumbo, Singita Kruger National Park, South Africa.
- 4. Nayara Hotel, La Fortuna, Costa Rica.
- 5. Four Seasons Resort (50 overwater bungalows on a lagoon), Bora Bora, French Polynesia.

My travels have led me to the great Raffles Hotel in Singapore; The Grand Hotel in Nuwara Eliya, Sri Lanka; Hotel Phoenicia in Valletta, Malta; Shepherd's in Cairo; Winter Palace in Luxor; Ritz in Madrid; George V in Paris; and even a mountain retreat in Simla in the India Himalayas as well as others in Europe, South America, and Africa. Memories and the photos that live in my head still lead me to the visual excitement and experience of those places.

I asked some of our residents about their most memorable hotel visits. JILL and TOM THOMAS: Ritz-Carlton in Laguna Beach. "We were married there and still love to go back." DOVIE and BOB KOOP: The Marriott in Buellton. "They gave us the anniversary suite complete with spa, heart-shaped bed, and mirrors all over the ceiling." They were with another couple and were served a sumptuous meal without ordering, with no idea if the numerous courses from caviar appetizers to lobster

would be \$30 or \$300, but they didn't care and still don't know. "It was so worth any price!"

"I stayed at a spectacular hotel in Hong Kong," said Dr. SID SHARZER. "I remember the elegant rooftop dining room where three servants would bring out a huge silver tray, remove the lid, and there was a very small serving for each course." 
How does the new iOS 8 Health App work? (Apple)

Once you have updated to iOS 8 on the iPhone, you will see a new heart icon appear on your home screen. This is the interactive Health app.

Tap on the heart icon to open the easy-to-read health and fitness Dashboard. This is where you can track all your health data in one place. (Apple has also created a HealthKit tool for developers which will allow all your health and fitness apps to work together.)



To begin, go to the light menu bar at the bottom. There you will see four icons: Dashboard, Health Data, Sources, and Medical ID.



First, complete the Medical ID card by tapping Edit. Then enter your emergency and important health information. Be sure to toggle-on, **Show When Locked**, if you would like the Medical Card info available from the Locked screen.

Next, go to the Health Data folder, select ALL, and then select items from this list you would like to see in your Dashboard. Simply select Active Calories or Steps, then select: Show All Data, Add Data Point, Share Data, and Show on Dashboard. Continue to tap on each individual category from the list that you would like to "Show on Dashboard." Soon you will see how many steps it is to go from one place to the next!

To rearrange the Dashboard by importance, hold down on an item's box and drag it up or down. Once the Dashboard is set, you can view it by Day, Week, Month, and Year.

The third icon on the menu bar is Sources, which is for your outside/third party apps, like NikeFuel, to access your health and fitness data. Some apps will display routes or allow you to compete with family or friends. But remember: only you decide what information is shared between the apps. Only you can allow the data from your blood pressure app to be automatically shared with your doctor or allow the nutrition app to tell your fitness apps how many calories you consume each day.

Apps that access HealthKit are required to have a privacy policy, so be sure to review these policies before providing them access to your health and fitness data. Go to Settings/Privacy/Health to view apps that have requested access to your Health data.

Note: when your phone is locked, all of your health and fitness data in the Health app is encrypted. Only your Medical ID card will show on the locked screen – if that was selected/toggled on.

And finally, remember to back up data stored in the Health app to iCloud. Why is all this so important? Well, for one, February is American Heart Month and second, without your health... you have nothing!

"Rhinestoned Says It All"

Pam Tillis is an American country music singer-songwriter and actress. She has been a formidable force in country music since her first single hit the charts in 1990. She has

racked up 14 Top Five hits including six that hit #1, and has sold over 6 million records. She was one of the first women in Nashville to produce her own album and won the coveted CMA Female Vocalist of the Year in 1994.

She is the daughter of country music singer Mel Tillis. No other word, real or invented for the occasion, sums up as well where Pam Tillis stands now. Rhinestoned!

She is, after all, a superstar as well as a survivor. A child of Music City royalty and a former rebel, she was determined to find her own way as a singer and songwriter – and she succeeded. She has written songs for some of the top singers in and beyond Nashville, including more than a few of her own hits.


Tillis knows what it's like to break the platinum barrier, to top the singles charts time and again, to bask in an ovation at her induction as a member of the Opry, or play in the intimate hush of the Bluebird Café.

"What I'm doing is country – but not necessarily the kind that you hear on the airwaves these days," Tillis explains, "Now, I admire a lot of this music; after all, I've sung rock, pop, R&B, and jazz, so I'm hardly a purist. But what I'm hearing now sounds often more like pop than country to me. And I just seriously felt called by that old different drummer to something a little bit more like the country I remember from my formative years, the country music of my youth." It's also something Tillis' fans and friends clamor for as she encounters them out on the road.

"It's that feeling of delight that comes from singing exactly what you were meant to sing at that moment." It's almost like a kind of ecstasy, which goes a long way when delivered by the incomparable Pam Tillis, without compromise or apology. You might call it joy, but there's a better word than that for this state of creative exhilaration. We'd call it Rhinestoned.

Pam Tillis will perform as part of an acoustic trio and promised there would be harmony for days. The harmonies are beautiful and people really love the acoustic thing. She makes the songs all her own, managing to sound both vulnerable and stoical as she ratchets up from subtle introspection to a chorus of almost Roy Orbison - like melodrama.

Fitness Update

Fitness Center and Outdoor Pool Rules

This is a beautiful time of the year in the desert and with that a prime time for guests and visitors to use the Fitness Centers and Outdoor Pools. Please help us provide a great experience for all by making your guests aware of the following rules.

- 1. All guests must sign in at the front desk prior to using any entity of the facility (ie., gym, pool, classes, rooms).
 - a. Guests must be with resident or possess a GUEST PASS and/or a PUNCH CARD.
- 2. Children under the age of 17 are limited to children's pool hours (Montecito Outdoor Pool: 2 pm 5 pm & Santa Rosa Outdoor Pool: 9 am 12 pm).



- a. No inflatable tubes or personal rafts are allowed at the outdoor pools.
 - i. ONLY ALLOWED from JUNE 1 AUGUST 31 (Monday Friday) and not on Holidays.
 - ii. Kickboards, noodles, and water wings are allowed.
- b. No food or drinks are allowed in the pool.
 - i. Plastic cups and plastic bottles can be at the tables but not within 3 feet of the pool edge.
- c. No running, jumping, diving, hanging, or swinging on hand rails or other types of loud erratic behavior are allowed.
- d. NO children under the age of 14 are allowed in the hot tubs at any time.
- e. No persons regardless of age are allowed to be wearing diapers in the pool.
- f. Portable radios are allowed only if earphones are being used.
- g. No pets are allowed in the outdoor pool area.
- 3. Children 17 years of age and younger must be accompanied by an adult at all times while using the Fitness Center.
 - a. No pets are allowed in the clubhouse unless accompanied by guide dog registration papers.
 - b. No children are allowed to use the walking track unsupervised.
 - i. Children and accompanied adults must have proper footwear and attire.
- 4. Closed-toed shoes must be worn at all times while using the Fitness Center.
 - a. ONLY CLOSED-TOED ATHLETIC SHOES CAN BE WORN ON THE WALKING TRACK (no golf shoes, heels, or sandals are allowed).
- 5. Only beverages with a secure top in a plastic container may be consumed in the Fitness Center and on the walking track.
 - a. ABSOLUTELY no alcoholic beverages are allowed.
- 6. There is a 30-minute time limit on all cardiovascular equipment if all of a specific type of cardiovascular equipment is being used.
 - a. Residents have priority over guests.
 - i. Guests may get back on cardio equipment when one frees up and a resident is not waiting.









Golf Operations

Correctly Repairing a Ball Mark

We are now in season and very busy! Due to the amount of rounds of golf played, we have quite a few ball marks on the greens. Please repair your ball mark and one other when playing. Remember to push the grass toward the center; never lift up and tear the roots.

PLEASE REPAIR BALL MARKS! Only YOU can prevent ball mark damage!

RIGHT!

1) Close the gap/hole with putter by patting down the ball mark.

- Insert Green-Save tool on the high side behind ball mark and push the back toward the center.
- 3) Do not pull up, twist or lift with the tool.
- 4) Push both sides of the ball mark into the center.
- Gently tap the surface down with putter.
- Never use loosened turf for repair.

WPONCI

Pulling up or lifting on the center or the sides will tear the roots and result in brown spots taking weeks for the surface to heal.

Do not pull up or twist with tool. This will only bring sand to the surface and tear the root system



RIGHT!

Insert tool and push back and sides forward to center. No damage to root system. Healing starts immediately.
